RECOMMENDATION:

THAT the Board of Directors approve the updated flood hazard mapping along the Eastman Drain as documented in the following reports and maps:

- 1. "Eastman Drain Flood Hazard Mapping Project (Hydrology Report)", prepared by JFSA Canada Inc., January 31, 2024.
- 2. "Eastman Drain Flood Hazard Mapping Project (Hydraulics Report)", prepared by JFSA Canada Inc., January 31, 2024.
- 3. "Eastman Drain Flood Hazard Mapping Project (100-Year Flood Hazard Maps)", prepared by JFSA Canada Inc., January 31, 2024.

AND FURTHER, THAT the Board of Directors approve the updated regulated limit on the Eastman Drain, as the extent of the 100-Year Flood Hazard plus a 15-metre allowance.

BACKGROUND:

The Eastman Drain is a watercourse which passes through parts of the Township of South Stormont and the City of Cornwall. The Eastman Drain starts in a marshy area north of Headline Road and west of Highway 138 and ends at the South Branch of the Raisin River, southeast of the intersection of South Branch Road and McConnell Avenue.

In accordance with Ontario Regulation 41/24, the RRCA is required to map areas where development is subject to permits under the *Conservation Authorities Act*. For the Eastman Drain, this is the extent of the flood hazard mapping plus an additional allowance of 15 metres. The flood hazard mapping represents the on-land limit of the 100-Year Flood Event Standard, a peak flow that has a probability of occurrence of one per cent during any given year.

The original Eastman Drain flood hazard mapping was completed in 1980 by Crysler and Lathem Limited. There have been land use, drainage and infrastructure changes as well as technological improvements and additional data collected since 1980. As such, the RRCA had recommended the flood mapping be updated. This project was funded in part by the United Counties of SDG, the Province of Ontario, and the Government of Canada through the Flood Hazard Identification and Mapping Program (FHIMP).

DISCUSSION:

JFSA Canada Inc. (JFSA), a qualified engineering firm with substantial flood mapping experience was retained by the RRCA, through a competitive tender process, to update the Eastman Drain flood hazard area (also described as the floodplain).

A digital terrain model was created using a LiDAR-derived digital elevation model (conducted by Airborne Imaging during 2021 and 2022) and bathymetry data collected through a topographic field survey by JFSA in November 2022 and March 2023. Detailed hydrologic modelling (SWMHYMO) and hydraulic modelling (HEC-RAS) was undertaken to determine the flood hazard area for the Eastman Drain. This was also presented as a series of flood hazard maps. The analysis was completed as per the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources Provincial Guidelines (2002) and the Federal Flood Mapping Guideline Series – Federal Hydrologic and Hydraulic Procedures for Flood Hazard Delineation Natural Resources Canada (2019).

Landowners in the affected area were notified of the updated flood hazard mapping by mail the week of March 18, 2024 and invited to learn more about the updates at the Public Information Centre on April 10, 2024. The details of the Public Information Centre were advertised in the March 20, 2024 issue of the Seaway News, posted on the RRCA website and on social media through Facebook, Instagram, and X (formerly Twitter). The RRCA also issued a media release on March 28, 2024 with details to attend the Public Information Centre. The public was also invited to schedule individual meetings with the RRCA at their convenience.

On April 10, 2024 from 5:00 pm – 6:00 pm, a virtual Public Information Centre was held where RRCA staff discussed the project and presented the updated flood hazard area (floodplain) and the associated regulated area. There were 24 attendees. The meeting was live-streamed on Teams and included a question-and-answer period.

The RRCA received 12 enquiries (emails, phone calls, or individual meetings) from landowners representing 110 individual properties between February 25, 2024 and April 26, 2024 to further discuss the project details and provide clarification regarding specific land parcels, the flood hazard area and associated regulated area.


A technical presentation will be made at the May 16, 2024, Board of Directors meeting.

Subject:	Regulation Policy and Mapping Updates Workplan

RECOMMENDATION:

THAT the Board of Directors receive and approve the Regulation Policy and Mapping Updates Workplan, as presented.

BACKGROUND:

On April 1, 2024, Ontario Regulation 41/24 (Prohibited Activities, Exemptions and Permits) and Part VI of the *Conservation Authorities Act* came into effect. This regulation replaces the Raisin Region Conservation Authority's (RRCA) previous "Regulation of Development, Interference with Wetlands and Alterations to Shorelines and Watercourses" regulation. (O.Reg. 175/06).

The proclamation of the new legislative and regulatory framework necessitated updates to existing Conservation Authority policies and procedures, including the Regulation Policies manual for the RRCA. The new regulations require publicly accessible maps posted to the authority's website defining areas subject to regulation by the RRCA.

Good policies provide clear guidelines for complying with regulatory requirements and ensure consistency, accountability, efficiency, and clarity.

Clear, publicly available mapping that defines regulated areas enhances transparency, accessibility, compliance, planning, enforcement, and public engagement, contributing to more effective regulatory implementation.

DISCUSSION:

RRCA staff have been working collaboratively with other eastern Ontario Conservation Authorities to prepare an updated regulation policies manual and updated regulations mapping to ensure compliance with the new regulations and to facilitate excellent service delivery across our combined jurisdictions.

The regulation policies and mapping will address the changes with the updated Act and Regulations; including, wetland areas, watercourses, and new exemptions.

The regulation policies update is expected to provide flexibility for developers and landowners who have already received *Planning Act* approvals prior to the new regulations being enacted (e.g. Site Plan Approvals, or Vacant Lots of record) where the safety of people and property are not expected to be jeopardized in the event of a natural hazard.

Consultation and public engagement will take place during the summer of 2024 which may include meetings with municipal staff, county staff, and agricultural organizations; a public information session, media releases, and website updates.

It is expected that RRCA staff will bring a board report to the September 2024 meeting summarizing the consultation. Updated mapping and policy documents will be presented at this time for review.

THAT the Board of Directors retroactively approve requesting \$6,650 from TD Bank Group to host a TD Tree Days event;

AND FURTHER THAT the Board of Directors approve requesting up to \$50,000 from the Invasive Species Centre to develop a phragmites management plan for RRCA conservation areas;

AND FURTHER THAT the Board of Directors approve requesting up to \$140,000 from the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks to restore and enhance a provincially significant coastal wetland within the St. Lawerence River Area of Concern at Cornwall/Akwesasne;

AND FURTHER THAT the Board of Directors approve requesting up to \$140,000 to support the development of a eutrophication strategy for the St. Lawrence River Area of Cornwall at Cornwall/Akwesasne;

AND FURTHER THAT the Board of Directors approve requesting up to \$50,000 to support the status review of the St. Lawrence River Area of Concern at Cornwall/Akwesasne – Habitat Beneficial Use Impairment;

AND FURTHER THAT the Board of Directors approve requesting up to \$5,000 from South Nation Conservation to develop a road salt application and storage education and outreach campaign to protect municipal drinking water sources;

AND FURTHER THAT the Board of Directors approve entering into an agreement with funders and partners, if required.

BACKGROUND:

To support and enhance the RRCA's programs and services, staff consistently investigate funding and partnership opportunities and submit grant applications when applicable. Funding opportunities may be annual grants typically secured by the RRCA or new funding opportunities. When a funder offers a different funding amount than the RRCA's original request, staff will adjust the workplan accordingly prior to accepting the funding.

Below is a summary of the 2024 grant applications submitted to date:

- Requested: \$790,315
- Approved: \$102,310
- Pending: \$635,000
- Not approved: \$53,085

DISCUSSION:

The following funding opportunities were identified by staff as a potential source of revenue for RRCA programs and projects:

- 1. Project Title: TD Tree Days
 - Funder: TD Bank Group
 - **Request**: \$6,650
 - **Summary:** Since 2018, the RRCA has partnered with TD Bank Group to host a community tree planting event, TD Tree Days. In 2024, the RRCA intends to host the event at Gray's Creek Conservation Area to replace trees impacted by invasive species and weather events.
 - Submission Deadline: April 30, 2024 (retroactive approval)
- 2. Project Title: Phragmites Management Plan for RRCA Conservation Areas
 - Funder: Invasive Species Centre Invasive Phragmites Control Fund
 - **Request**: up to \$50,000
 - **Summary:** Funding will support phragmites mapping and the development of a phragmites management plan for the RRCA's conservation areas.
 - Submission Deadline: May 30, 2024
- **3. Project Title:** Restoring and Enhancing a Provincially Significant Coastal Wetland within the St. Lawrence River Area of Concern at Cornwall/Akwesasne
 - Funder: Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks
 - **Request**: up to \$140,000 over two years
 - **Summary:** Funding will support the restoration of part of the Charlottenburgh Marsh. This project will address actions identified in the St. Lawrence River Remedial Action Plan to restore water quality and ecosystem health.
 - Submission Deadline: May 30, 2024

- **4. Project Title:** Eutrophication Strategy for the St. Lawrence River Area of Concern at Cornwall/Akwesasne
 - Funder: Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks
 - Request: up to \$140,000 over two years
 - **Summary:** Funding will support the development of a eutrophication strategy to improve water quality in the St. Lawrence River Area of Concern at Cornwall/Akwesasne. This project will address actions identified in the St. Lawrence River Remedial Action Plan to restore water quality and ecosystem health.
 - Submission Deadline: May 30, 2024
- **5. Project Title:** St. Lawrence River Area of Concern at Cornwall/Akwesasne Habitat Beneficial Use Impairment Review
 - Funder: Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks
 - **Request:** up to \$50,000
 - **Summary:** Funding will support the review of past Habitat Beneficial Use Impairment reports and recommended next steps.
 - Submission Deadline: May 30, 2024
- 6. Project Title: Road Salt Application and Storage Education and Outreach Campaign for Drinking Water Source Protection
 - Funder: South Nation Conservation Eastern Ontario Water Resources Program
 - **Request**: up to \$5,000
 - **Summary:** Funding will support the development of an education and outreach campaign for road salt application and storage, as per revised draft policies in the Raisin-South Nation Source Protection Plan.
 - Submission Deadline: June 6, 2024
